MS. STEINBERG ALBIN: Good morning and welcome. My name is Jessica Steinberg Albin. I am Senior Counsel in the Bureau of Legal Affairs for the Department of Sanitation, DSNY. Thank you for attending this public hearing this morning.

DSNY is conducting this remote hearing in accordance with the requirements of the City Administrative Procedure Act. The purpose of this hearing is to receive comments from the public on DSNY's proposed rule regarding the residential --

(Disruptive noise).

MS. STEINBERG ALBIN: If everyone could mute. Thank you.

Regarding the residential collection of designated recyclable materials to require the source separation of organic waste.

This rules was published by DSNY in the City Record on July 10, 2023, with a scheduled hearing date of today, August 10, 2023. Additionally, DSNY e-mailed copies of the rule to all New York City local elected officials, the City's fifty-nine community boards, media and interested parties, and

published the proposed rule on its website.

Intro Number 244-A of 2023, which became law on July 8, 2023, or Local Low 85 of 2023, requires the Department of Sanitation to establish a mandatory citywide organics collection program. This program will make the source separation of residential organic waste in the City of New York mandatory.

The law requires DSNY to implement the mandatory organics collection program in 30 residential sanitation districts by
October 2, 2023, and all remaining sanitation districts by October 7, 2024. This proposed rule designates such sanitation districts in accordance with designations made for the source separation of yard waste in rules promulgated earlier this year.

The rule also specifies the types of containers in which organic waste must be placed curbside, and expands existing requirements related to recyclable materials for residential buildings containing four or more units to apply to organic waste. In addition to implementing the laws

requirements related to mandatory organics collection, this proposed rule implements changes related to yard waste collection made by the law, including extending mandatory yard waste separation requirement year-round, rather than for eight months out of the year.

Though this rule also allows for the use of plastic bags for the disposal of designated yard waste. It clarifies that yard waste cannot be commingled with organics if yard waste is set out in paper or plastic bags. Previously, yard waste was not allowed to be disposed in plastic bags, and there was no rule regulating whether yard waste and organics could be commingled.

A court reporter is present today and will record the hearing. You may present an oral statement or submit written comments concerning the proposed rule. We have been accepting written comments on the proposed rule since it was published. Today is the deadline for submission of written comments. Such comments may be e-mailed directly to nycrules@dsny.nyc.gov by 5:00 p.m. today. DSNY will make available a copy of all

written comments received through today, together with the hearing transcript, for viewing on its website within the next few weeks. DSNY will carefully consider all the comments it receives today at the hearing and all written comments it receives.

I will begin calling those of you who wish to speak this morning in the order in which you have signed up to testify. While the notice requested that persons wishing to testify sign up in advance of this hearing, anyone wishing to testify at this time may do so by indicating in the chat area that you wish to testify, by indicating your name and affiliation, if any.

When you speak, please state your name and affiliation and speak slowly and clearly, so that the court reporter can understand and accurately record your statement. We also ask that you limit your statement to five minutes. Thank you.

And I will now begin by calling on Council Member Shahana Hanif.

MS. HANIF: Thank you and good morning.

I'm Council Member Shahana Hanif, and I

represent the 39th Council District in Brooklyn.

I would like to begin by thanking the Department of Sanitation for holding this hearing regarding Local Law 85 of 2023, the mandatory residential organic composting law. As the lead sponsor of this law, I am grateful to DSNY for working alongside me, my staff, my fellow council colleagues, and the countless environmental advocates who worked so hard to get this law across the finish line.

For too long, most New Yorkers have disposed of their organic waste together with their trash, which result in compostable waste being incinerated or left to rot in landfills that are predominantly located in communities of color. Incinerators and landfills emit disruptive greenhouse gases and harm the health of these residents.

Mandating organic composting is an important step in meeting our city's environmental justice goals. I am proud that with the full implementation of this law, all New Yorkers will now reap the benefits of

organic composting. I commend DSNY for the steps it is taking to rule out this program, including by sending mailers, conducting door-to-door outreach, and delivering free brown bins to those who requests them. While I appreciate the Department's efforts to spread awareness of this new law, I would like to raise a few concerns and offer recommendations that would strengthen the program's rollout.

First, the October 13, 2023, deadline to request a brown composting bin will significantly limit the ability of residents to obtain a bin at no cost. This could result in low and middle income New Yorkers needing to purchase their own bins in order to comply with the program. As such, this deadline should be removed completely. Residents should be able to request a brown bin at any time up to and after April 2025 when civil penalties kick in.

We must ensure that our hard-won program is equitable and does not impose undue financial burden. Additionally, changes should be made to the outreach

materials, including the mailer that has been sent out to clarify that it is mandatory for residents to separate and compost their food waste. Currently, the mailer only specifies that leaves and yard wastes must be separated.

While penalties do not kick in until April 2025, we must use the next year and a half to build up muscle memory and ensure that residents are properly participating in the program. Further, I am concerned that DSNY does not yet have translated outreach materials. Outreach will be ineffective if it is not in the languages that New Yorkers understand.

Door-to-door efforts and mailed materials should be directly informed by the language and cultural needs of each of our city's unique neighborhoods. The Department's implementation plan states that outreach will occur in fourteen languages, and I expect that the Department will follow through with this commitment and collaborate with the local council member and community partners.

Lastly, the Department should create an 1 outreach toolkit that volunteers can use to 2 3 help get the word out to neighborhoods. are privileged to have many, many informed 4 5 and enthusiastic community members who are 6 eager to support the Department's efforts. These folks know their own neighborhoods best 7 and are a critical resource in our efforts 8 for successful participation. 9 10 I look forward to continuing to work 11 with the Department to ensure that the implementation of mandatory residential 12 13 composting is efficient and inclusive. Thank 14 you for your time and consideration. 15 I would also like to thank my 16 legislative and budget interns Savannah Jackson and Ryan Alwi, for their work in 17 18 preparing this morning's testimony. 19 Thank you. 20 MS. STEINBERG ALBIN: Thank you, 2.1 Council Member. 22 I would now like to call on Christine 2.3 Datz Romero. 2.4 MS. DATZ ROMERO: Thank you and good 25 morning. My name is Christina Datz Romero,

and I have the pleasure to testify on behalf of the Save our Compost coalition today, which advocates for organic waste recycling as a free public service for all residents of New York City.

We are very happy that we finally have a mandatory and comprehensive curbside collection program, and we have a few comments about the rules that were published by the Department of Sanitation.

We would like to recommend that the Department allow both plastic or paper yard waste bags for the collection of yard waste. If we allow paper yard waste bags to continue being used, we avoid the negative impacts of plastic production and pollution, which I think we should try to do in any small way we can.

We are also curious whether the

Department could clarify whether yard waste
will be now collected separately from any
other organics, since yard waste is no longer
allowed to be commingled with the other
organics in our waste stream.

The next comment we have is about rigid

containers. Containers will be allowed with a capacity of up to 55 gallons, and we are concerned that lifting hundreds or potentially thousands of these bins during one shift might lead to injuries for sanitation workers. To protect sanitation workers, we urge DSNY to use mechanized trucks that can lift up large containers of organics, especially in high-density neighborhoods.

Bin distribution, currently DSNY is giving only one brown bin for each building. We would like to suggest that DSNY provide at least, at the very least, one bin per 50 units, and we also like to support Shahana's request for bins to be made available on a continuous basis.

Outreach and education program, the success of the curbside composting program is depending on participation and effective outreach and education on composting. The Department should utilize the network of organizations who have done outreach education in New York City since 1997 through the New York City Compost Project.

Unfortunately, the compost project is slated to be reduced in funding from \$7 million to only \$3.5 million by FY26. There needs to be a sustained community-based approach to outreach and education to make this program a success.

As we all see from the participation and diversion rates for metal, glass, plastic, and paper recycling, new Yorkers do not participate at sufficient levels. The rollout of curbside composting is an opportunity to do better.

Lastly, we have comments about processing. We applaud that DSNY is developing an RFP to expand processing capacity, and would like to request that a significant portion of the organics be processed locally, and that could rate from community-based registered facilities to larger commercial facilities, to create compost as a soil amendment.

This approach will create a circular system which has additional environmental benefits. Compost improves urban soil, which allows capture of storm water run-off, help

2	which provides shade and clean air and, of
3	course, very importantly, also creates local

12	Keyser. I'm the chair of the Brooklyn Solid
13	Waste Advisory Board, and this testimony is
14	on behalf of all four Solid Waste Advisory
15	Boards, the Brooklyn, Queens, Bronx, and
16	Manhattan.
17	Thank you to the DSNY first for hosting
18	this hearing and for this opportunity to
19	speak. The Manhattan, Brooklyn, Queens, and
20	Bronx Solid Waste Advisory Boards, the SWABs,
21	share the following recommendations regarding
22	the Department of Sanitation's collection and
23	source separation of organic waste, as per
24	Intro 244-A.
25	The SWABs agree with the DSNY's

proposed rule changes. However, though the allowance for plastic bags should not be prohibited at this early stage of the program in order to encourage participation, we believe that the use of plastic bags should be phased out through outreach and education, to minimize environmental and health impacts.

The SWABs believe that organics diversion collection and processing must be executed in a way that maximizes participation and minimizes environmental and health impacts. And we view the proposed rule changes through this lens.

First, participation through outreach and education. As source-separated organics are now part of the recycling category, a commitment to sustained outreach and education to support and increase participation as needed in both organics and recycling diversion.

Any organics diversion plan must, as its central principle, increase participation through incentives of convenience, substituting trash collection days with organics and recycling collection days, as is

done in the Department of Education when schools are rolled into this organics collection, will both increase convenience and encourage participation. As trash pick-up days decrease, residents will rely on other streams for diversion.

Similarly, as residents increase organics diversion from their trash bin, there will be a commensurate decrease in the amount of landfill and incineration bound trash. And to ensure that residents participate in the organics separation, we recommend that DSNY provide at least one bin per 50 apartment units, echoing Christina -- what Christina just said.

And in addition, to ensure that buildings have enough time to request bins, to also echo, we recommend that DSNY allow residents to order bins on an ongoing basis as well. We encourage all outreach and education to create awareness, increase comprehension and motivation, take into account attitudes towards recycling and intention to participate be convenient, and maintain participation behavior over time.

Outreach campaigns should be longstanding, always changing, and attention-grabbing, and should include ads in the subways, buses and LinkNYC kiosks, billboards, TV and radio, Con Ed bulletins; in short, wherever New Yorkers may see them.

Additionally, curbside and kitchen bin distribution are key motivators. DSNY outreach should leverage the resources and work of the Department of Education and the area of participation and waste diversion in schools.

Processing is an important part of this, and the SWABs recommend that the processing of source-separated organics should prioritize composting solutions over anaerobic digestion and anaerobic co-digestion and processing.

Composting sequesters carbon, emits less greenhouse gas, and produces a product that can be used to enrich our soil, often reducing the need for artificial fertilizers made from fossil fuels, further reducing greenhouse gas emissions, co-digestion of organics produces leaky methane, carbon

dioxide, and produces a bi-product of sewage 1 sludge, which is often contaminated with 2 3 plastics, PFAS, powerful pharmaceuticals and other toxins, all contaminants that cannot be 4 effectively mitigated by treatment processes. 5 6 As such, DSNY should preserve and 7 expand local composting processing capacity 8 for and usage of organics compost within the 9 five boroughs, in addition to forging 10 partnerships with local accessible vineyards 11 and farms that might have interest and land for composting NYC Organics for local 12 13 application. 14 There is no time to waste in 15 implementing these proven cost-effective 16 waste diverting solutions, and we applaud the DSNY for moving forward and the City Council 17 18 for passing this law. 19 Thank you. 20 MS. STEINBERG ALBIN: Thank you for 21 your testimony.

We will now call on Eric Goldstein.

MR. GOLDSTEIN: Good morning. My name is Eric Goldstein, and I'm the New York City Environment Director at the Natural Resources

Defense Council. NRDC is delighted by the passage of Intro 244-A and thank Council Members Hanif, Nurse, and Powers for their leadership, and Commissioner Tej for moving forward with implementation of this important law.

Intro 244-A, which on July 8th became Local Law 85, requires the Department to establish universal curbside organics source separation collection program for serving every city household. And to implement such a program, this October for 30 districts and by October 2024 for the remaining districts, the law also requires the source separation of yard waste on a year-round basis.

NRDC is pleased to testify in support of the proposed rules implementing this statute, that are the subject of today's hearing. Specifically, we support the provision and the new rules dealing with how separated yard waste must be placed out for collection.

In particular, we welcome the proposed requirement that food scraps and yard waste, if commingled, may not be set out in paper or

plastic bags, but must be placed out for collection in rodent-proof containers. This makes sense because to allow commingled or organics to be placed out for collection in paper or plastic bags would invite further rodent infestation and reverse the process the Administration is making by requiring containerization of futuristical (phonetic) waste.

It also makes sense because keeping yard waste separate from food scraps is advisable, since yard waste is least suited for anaerobic digestion processing and should primarily be digested at composting facilities.

Second, while we support the

Department's proposed rule allowing for

separated yard waste to be set out for

collection in plastic bags, as this program

is phased in, we hope that the Department

will revisit this approach in several years.

Once residents get into the year-round habit of separating yard waste for collection, the Department should require that such waste be only placed out for pickup

in paper bags. Paper bags are compostable and would make the processing of yard waste at composting facilities easier and less expensive for city taxpayers.

Two final points: Intro 244-A requires the Department to undertake a comprehensive outreach and education program for residents, building owners, and community-based organizations. We cannot stress strongly enough the importance of this requirement.

Simply stated, to ensure the success of the organics collection program and achieve its worthy environmental and economic goals, it's essential that the Department lead an intensive and effective campaign, to inform New Yorkers about the value of participating in this program and how to do so.

And a key part of that effort should be to make brown bins available to the public on a continuing basis, at least during the first year following phase-in, for every district.

Finally, Local Law 85 and Section

16-129 of the Administrative Code, that it

amends, also emphasize the need for expanding
and encouraging the composting of

source-separated organics. Specifically, the statute calls for the Siting Task Force to identify additional locations for yard waste composting and for the 4th coming 2026 solid waste management plan, to provide for maximizing composting of organic waste.

This composting expansion can and must be done in a way that doesn't adversely affect already overburdened environmental justice communities and that, in fact, supports waste equity goals, and we're convinced that that can be done.

We hope the Department will take steps to work with stakeholders to advance the goal of expanding composting, so that the promise of the Organics Source Separation Program will be fully realized. And we thank you for your attention.

MS. STEINBERG ALBIN: Thank you for your testimony.

We will now call on Samantha McBride.

MS. MCBRIDE: Good morning. My name is Samantha McBride. I'm speaking as a resident of New York City. I do not represent any

company, product, or business.

I commend the Department on the drafting of these rules. My comments concern the requirement that bags be constructed of low-density polyethylene or linear low-density polyethylene. Compostable yard waste bags otherwise meeting rule specifications exist are proven and in commerce. I have carried out research on compostable plastic bag use in yard and source-separated organics in a dense urban setting in Milan, Italy.

I have followed collections from curb through processing at three facilities there. The benefit of compostable bags, its full breakdown of bagging scraps and microparticles from bags after debagging equipment, reducing focil plastic contamination of compost.

I also affirm the statements of Christina Datz Romero and Rhonda Keyser, that composting, as opposed to other conversion technologies, be localized and regionalized for New York City organics.

I request that the requirement of

low-density polyethylene or linear 1 low-density polyethylene be removed and that 2 3 an option for a clear certified compostable bag be an option. This comment is in no way 4 meant to promote sales of compostable plastic 5 6 products. Instead, it reflects my considered 7 research and experience in this area, and the 8 goal of a socially just and stainable 9 DSNY composting program. 10 Thank you. 11 MS.
