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MS. LIGUORI: Good morning and welcome. My name is Madelynn Liguori. I am Senior Counsel in the Bureau of Legal Affairs for the Department of Sanitation. Thank you for attending this public hearing this morning.

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DSNY is conducting this remote hearing in accordance with the requirements of the City Administrative Procedure Act. The purpose of this hearing is to receive comments from the public on DSNY's proposed rule relating to the use of receptacles by certain commercial establishments. This rule was published by DSNY in the City Record of September 19th, 2023, with a scheduled hearing date of today, October 24th, 2023. Additionally, DSNY e-mailed copies of the rule to all New York City local elected officials, the City's fifty-nine community boards, media and interested parties, and published the proposed rule on its website.

DSNY rules currently allow for all commercial establishments to set up their waste and recyclable materials within one hour of closing, provided that the scheduled collection occurs before the establishment next reopens for business, and only if such materials are placed

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out for collection in receptacles with tight-fitting lids. Those establishments that place materials out for collection in bags, regardless of the time they close, may place those materials at the curb no earlier than 8:00 p.m. DSNY recently adopted rules that require all food-related businesses and commercial establishments, that are a part of a chain of stores, to set out any putrescible solid waste, including refuse and organic waste, at the curb for private carter collection in rigid receptacles with tight-fitting lids. This new proposed rule would amend this recent rule and expand this requirement to include all commercial establishments, regardless of whether such establishments have food-related businesses or are part of a chain of stores. These changes are a part of the City's commitment to cleaning up New York City streets and reducing food sources for rats. Businesses are generators of putrescible waste, including organics, and bags of waste set out

for collection on the curb, even when in

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compliance with existing waste set-out requirements, attract rats and vermin and are unsightly. Requiring these businesses that produce any amount of food waste to place their putrescible waste in sealed containers will meaningfully limit potential food sources for vermin, while also helping to keep our sidewalks free of piles of black bags that obstruct pedestrians.

These changes align with other City initiatives to increase the use of containers for waste storage and collection, creating cleaner, more livable, and more vibrant streets and neighborhoods across New York City.

A court reporter is present today and will record the hearing. You may present an oral statement or submit written comments concerning the proposed rule. We have been accepting written comments on the proposed rule since it was published.

Today is the deadline for submission of written comments. Such comments may be e-mailed directly to nycrules@dsny.nyc.gov by 5:00 p.m. today. DSNY will make available a copy of all written comments received through

today, together with the hearing transcript, for viewing on its website within the next few weeks. DSNY will carefully consider all the comments it receives today at the hearing and all written comments it receives.

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I will begin calling those who wish to speak this morning in the order in which you have signed up to testify. While the notice requested that persons wishing to testify sign up in advance of this hearing, anyone wishing to testify at this time may do so by indicating in the chat area that you wish to testify, by indicating your name and affiliation, if any.

When you speak, please state your name and affiliation, and speak slowly and clearly so that the court reporter can understand and accurately record your statement. We also ask that you limit your statements to five minutes.

I would now like to call the first person to testify, Clare Miflin, from the Center for Zero Waste and Design. Clare.

MS. MIFLIN: Hello, my name is Clare Miflin, Executive Director of the Center for Zero Waste Design. We are a

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nonprofit that develops and implements design strategies to reduce and better manage waste, whether in buildings or in the public realm, which enables cities to improve streetscapes and equitably achieve zero waste and secular material systems.

We thank the Department of
Sanitation for this opportunity to
comment on their proposed rule and we
fully support the Department of
Sanitation's aim to get rid of bags of
trash piled up on sidewalks and instead
move to a system where waste is
collected from containers by mechanized
trucks, whether this is by DSNY or by
private carters.

However, we do believe that in this change, there are so many opportunities to achieve other goals, whether improving streetscapes, reducing waste, increasing diversion, or reducing costs to businesses and residents.

We believe slight adjustments to this proposed rule would allow the City

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to move closer to its zero waste goal and take up less valuable public space on sidewalks.

Since earlier this year, when DSNY first adopted the rule requiring food-related business to use rigid receptacles, we, and I'm sure most of the people in this court, have seen trash bins permanently placed on sidewalks in front of those businesses, often chained to lamp posts or storm drains, often overfull. And even when neat, they still take up valuable sidewalk space. And I have put some photos in my uploaded testimony.

We see several ways that this rule could be tied to initiatives to reduce waste and separate food waste in various ways. At a minimum, it could be -- DSNY could use this opportunity to enforce the commercial organics rules. We've seen so many businesses that should fall under those rules just setting out trash and not any organic waste.

Next, we had an idea that maybe what

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if this rule only allowed one trash bin per business, because then that would incentivize the business to separate organics waste and recycling. Because mostly I just see businesses set out trash, despite the fact that most of the food services business waste is organic waste. So if it was limited to one trash bin per business, it would incentivize those businesses to better separate waste, to use washable dishware and cups within the restaurant to minimize use of disposable packaging.

And larger businesses have opportunities to store bins within inside or use compaction equipment. So I think the one trash bin rule would provide the needed relief for small businesses that are very space constrained and incentivize all businesses to produce less trash.

But most importantly, I think this initiative, I think the most opportunities would happen if it was tied to a commercial waste zoning,

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because this would give private haulers an incentive to containerize waste, and to provide those containers, and then those containers could be much -- those containers could be in the street themselves, they could be shared between multiple businesses, they could be the larger containers that are more designed into streetscapes and could look much better and they could have so many benefits. So since that is upcoming anyway, I think tying those two things together would bring a lot of value.

I'm also really worried with the latest move to require one to nine unit buildings to use rigid containers in the future. On our kind of main streets with commercial storefronts and one to nine family residences above, there could be six or more bins in front of one single storefront, for the residences above and the commercial businesses. And yes, we will have got rid of bags on sidewalks but we'll just have so many permanent bins on the

1	the city and I have a small business
2	that provides these big containers that
3	DSNY wants to use in the future.
4	And I just want to second what
5	Claire says, that it will be good to
6	have an option to offer shared
7	containers to small business so small
8	businesses go and drop the trash through
9	these containers. And the private
10	carting can have an agreement with the
11	City that they will collect these
12	containers and maybe the small
13	businesses will pay a fee to use these
14	containers and then the private carter
15	will be paid. And that's about it.
