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2	MS. LIGUORI: Good morning and welcome. My
3	name is Madelynn Liguori. I am Senior Counsel
4	in the Bureau of Legal Affairs for the
5	Department of Sanitation. Thank you for
6	attending this public hearing this morning.
7	DSNY is conducting this remote hearing in
8	accordance with the requirements of the City
9	Administrative Procedure Act. The purpose of
10	this hearing is to receive comments from the
11	public on DSNY's proposed rule relating to
12	DSNY's initial zone rule for commercial waste
13	zones.
14	This rule was initially published by DSNY
15	in the City Record on January 30, 2024, with a
16	scheduled hearing date of March 7, 2024. Since
17	the initial publication, DSNY received a
18	request to switch the virtual platform for the
19	hearing from WebEx to Teams for accessibility
20	reasons. As a result, DSNY re-published the
21	rule in the City Record on February 22, 2024,
22	with a scheduled hearing date of today.
23	Additionally, DSNY emailed copies of this rule
24	to all New York City local elected officials,
25	the City's fifty-nine community boards, media

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2	and interested parties, and published the
3	proposed rule on its website.
4	In 2019, New York City enacted Local Law
5	199, requiring the establishment of a new
6	program for the collection of commercial waste.
7	The program, known as the Commercial Waste
8	Zones Program, is a safe, efficient, and
9	competitive collection system designed to
10	provide high-quality service to New York City
11	businesses while advancing the City's waste
12	diversion and sustainability goals. Pursuant
13	to Local Law 199, codified in Title 16-B of the
14	New York City Administrative Code, the
15	geographic area of New York City has been
16	divided into 20 commercial waste zones.
17	Pursuant to a request for proposals
18	process, three private carters were selected by
19	the Department to serve businesses within each
20	commercial waste zone, for a total of 18
21	carters selected for 20 zones. Additionally,
22	five carters were selected to provide
23	containerized commercial waste collection
24	services from dumpsters and compactors
25	citywide. The selected carters are referred to

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2	as "awardees." The resulting contracts with
3	the awardees include standards for pricing,
4	customer service, safety, environmental health,
5	and requirements to promote the City's
6	commitment to recycling and sustainability.
7	Local Law 199 requires the Department to
8	promulgate rules setting forth an
9	implementation start date and a final
10	implementation start date for each commercial
11	waste zone established pursuant to section
12	16-1001. Different implementation start dates
13	and implementation end dates may be established
14	for different commercial waste zones. See
15	administrative Code 16-1002(e)(3). This rule
16	sets the implementation start date and final
17	implementation date only for the first
18	commercial waste zone to be implemented -
19	Queens Central. Subsequent rules will set the
20	implementation dates for the zones being
21	implemented later.
22	DSNY's authority for these rules is found
23	in Section 753 and Section 1043(g) of the New
24	York City Charter and Title 16-B of the New
25	York City Administrative Code.

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2	Please note that this hearing only relates
3	to the proposed rule that designates the first
4	commercial waste zone to be implemented as
5	Queens Central. It does not address any other
6	topic with respect to commercial waste zones.
7	We ask that oral statements and written
8	comments be directed to the limited subject
9	matter of the proposed rule.
10	A court reporter is present today and will
11	record the hearing. You may present an oral
12	statement or submit written comments concerning
13	the proposed rule. We have been accepting
14	written comments on the proposed rule since it
15	was published. Today is the deadline for
16	submission of written comments. Such comments
17	may be emailed directly to
18	nycrules@dsny.nyc.gov by 5:00 p.m. today.
19	DSNY will make available a copy of all
20	written comments received through today,
21	together with the hearing transcript, for
22	viewing on its website within the next two
23	weeks.
24	DSNY will carefully consider all the
25	comments it receives today at the hearing and

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2	all written comments it receives.
3	I will begin calling those of you who wish
4	to speak this morning in the order in which you
5	have signed up to testify. While the notice
6	requested that persons wishing to testify sign
7	up in advance of this hearing, anyone wishing
8	to testify at this time may do so by indicating
9	in the chat area that you wish to testify by
10	indicating your name and affiliation, if any.
11	When you speak, please state your name and
12	affiliation, and speak slowly and clearly so
13	that the court reporter can understand and
14	accurately record your statement. We also ask
15	that you limit your statement to five minutes.
16	I would first like to call Alex Veman to
17	testify.
18	MR. VEMAN: Yes, hello. Thank you and
19	good morning.
20	I have already met some people from the
21	BIC team who have come to my place of work and
22	we have discussed technology, improvements;
23	however, from DSNY, I have not had any
24	meetings, so I'm not sure who everyone is with
25	DSNY.

1 2 But I have been asked to share my testimony. I don't know who your customers 3 4 are, who resides within your area of service. I do, however, know what is available publicly. 5 One thing that bothers me is that I'm not 6 7 sure of the --THE INTERPRETER: I'm sorry, for the 8 9 interpreter, the tech has frozen a little bit. 10 MR. VEMAN: There are violations. 11 THE INTERPRETER: I'm sorry, this is the 12 interpreter, I'm having quality issues, can we 13 switch to the other interpreter in case their 14 internet is more clear. 15 Thank you. I'm going to restart and join 16 again. Thank you. 17 MR. VEMAN: It's okay. 18 I don't know about the company 19 specifically, but many of the violations, my 20 company has not had; others, I'm unsure about. 21 We keep everything clean, again, zero violations. However, there are other vendors 22 that do have violations, but going against our 23 24 specific company is wrong because due to the 25 acquisition and the eminency, I would like it

1 2 to stay small and keep no issues on our streets, and opening it up would cause a lot of 3 4 issues. Smaller or medium-sized companies is how it should be kept, in order for quality 5 6 control purposes. 7 If we have companies that have over a thousand people, that is going to affect the 8 9 quality over time for sure. 10 Thank you. Thank you for your time. 11 MS. LIGUORI: Thank you so much, 12 Mr. Veman, for your testimony. I would now like to call Eric Goldstein, 13 14 Senior Attorney and NYC Environment Director 15 for the National (sic) Resources Defense Council. Eric. 16 17 MR. GOLDSTEIN: Good morning, everyone. 18 My name is Eric Goldstein, New York City 19 Environment Director at the Natural Resources 20 Defense Council. 21 NRDC has been active for decades on New 22 York solid waste issues. Our longterm goal has been to advocate for the transformation of New 23 24 York's waste policy from primary reliance on 25 landfilling and incineration, to making waste

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2	prevention, composting, recycling, and equity
3	the cornerstones of city solid waste policy in
4	the 21st Century.
5	The City Council's passage of Local Law
6	199 of 2019 was a historic step foreward. It
7	was designed to bring about widespread
8	improvements in the irrational,
9	pollution-generating, worker-mistreating,
10	safety-minimizing system of commercial waste
11	handling that has defied solution for decades.
12	And if successfully implemented, this new waste
13	zone system will usher in a new era of public
14	safety, worker fairness, and sustainable waste
15	disposal in the nation's largest city.
16	NRDC supports the proposed rule that the
17	Department of Sanitation is advancing today,
18	which establishes a start date of 9/3/24 and a
19	final implementation date of two 2/20/2025
20	(sic) for the first waste zone in Queens
21	Central Zone.
22	Of course, successful implementation of
23	the Local Law 199 mandate in all 20 zones will
24	be key to achieving the full and lasting
25	benefits envisioned by the City Council. We

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2	have three recommendations for the Department
3	as it continues to move forward with its waste
4	zone implementation.
5	First, we urge the Department to make
б	public its criteria for assessing the
7	effectiveness of the implementation of the
8	first waste zone and to provide New Yorkers
9	with updates on startup successes and
10	challenges and how they are being addressed in
11	the phase-in period.
12	Second, we hope the Department will
13	propose in the near future another rule setting
14	forth the implementation schedule for the
15	remaining 19 zones, one that provides for the
16	start up all 20 zones, no later than
17	December 2025. We would also welcome a report
18	by the Department, explaining the basis for the
19	selection of the contractors for 20 zones, and
20	how that conforms with Local Law 199.
21	Finally, we urge the Department to analyze
22	how it can use the rebuilt marine transfer
23	stations to accommodate commercial waste, as
24	was originally envisioned in the 2006 Solid
25	Waste Management Plan.

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1 2 Thank you for your attention and for advancing this proposed rule today. 3 4 MS. LIGUORI: Thank you very much for your testimony. I would now like to call Alia 5 Soomro from the New York League of Conservation 6 7 Voters. MS. SOMRO: Hi, good morning. My name is 8 9 Alia Soomro, and I'm the deputy director for 10 New York City policy at the New York League of 11 Conservation Voters. Thank you for the 12 opportunity to testify. 13 NYLCV strongly supported the passage of Local Law 199 of 2019, establishing the City's 14 15 first commercial waste zones program. Championed by a wide group of stakeholders, if 16 implemented effectively, this law will overhaul 17 18 the City's antiquated and inefficient 19 commercial waste management system by dividing 20 the City into 20 zones, limiting each zone to a 21 maximum of three private sanitation companies, 22 selected through a competitive bid process and 23 holding companies to a higher standard. NYLCV welcomed DSNY's announcement in 24 25 January of the Queens Central Commercial Waste

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Zone, the City's first zone to be implemented
as part of this law. While it has taken the
City far too long to get to this point for such
a commonsense policy, the CWZ law will bring
the City closer to its zero waste goals and
improve the safety of workers, pedestrians, and
cyclists. It will also cut down on traffic
congestion, improve air quality, and curb the
City's tailpipe pollution and carbon emissions,
which is especially important to low income and
communities of color throughout the City.
Although the first zone is slated to roll
out in September of this year, with the final
implementation date for this zone in
January 2025, we're still waiting for the law's
full implementation, that's 19 other zones.
While we understand the importance of starting
off on the right foot and learning from other
cities attempts at overhauling its waste

system, it is imperative that the City carries out this law in a timely and transparent manner.

We urge the City to dedicate the requisite amount of resources and funding for staffing,

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1 2 education, and outreach to fully implement the CWZ law. 3 4 We also urge the DSNY to continue working towards transitioning to zero emission vehicles 5 for DSNY and commercial sanitation trucks. 6 7 Additionally, the City must continue working with Dcast, utility companies, and 8 9 industry professionals to ensure adequate 10 charging infrastructure is installed and 11 available for sanitation trucks throughout the 12 City. Requiring cleaner fleets as part of the 13 City's move to CWZs is also the best way to 14 bring measurable air quality improvements to 15 neighborhoods that house a disproportionately 16 higher number of haulers and waste processing facilities. 17 18 NYLCV looks forward to seeing the timely 19 implementation of this law so that all New 20 Yorkers have the chance to breathe a little 21 easier. 22 Thank you for the opportunity to testify. 23 MS. LIGUORI: Thank you very much for your 24 testimony. 25 I would like to now call Lacy Tauber, the

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1 2 legislative director for the Brooklyn Borough President's office. Lacy. 3 4 MS. TAUBER: Hi, thank you so much. So I'm providing testimony today, as you 5 mentioned, on behalf of Brooklyn Borough 6 7 President Antonio Reynoso, who I'm sure, as you know, was champion of Local Law 199, among many 8 9 of the applicants who are present today. 10 Thank you for holding this hearing today, 11 after many years of delays, the borough 12 president is heartened to see implementation of 13 CWZ finally moving forward. When the Council 14 passed this bill in 2019, we could not have 15 guessed that it would be 2025 by the time the first zone was finalized. 16 Due to the delay in timeline and the 17 18 ongoing controversy surrounding RFP process and 19 resulting awards, it is even more important 20 that we get this done right. 21 This means providing transparency and 22 accountability at every step of DSNY's implementation of this transformative program. 23 24 This rule-making process is, therefore, a 25 missed opportunity to codify such measures;

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there are three that I want to go over quickly. One is outreach and education. Preparing businesses to participate with clear and accessible information is critical for the program's success. In fact, the law requires the commissioners of -- commissioner of sanitation and the chair of BIC to create an outreach and education program aimed at businesses, including information about how to work with the chosen carters, as well as the program's health and safety benefits. According to law, this program should include, but not be limited to, seminars, webs, conferences, and a multilingual education program. Yet, we have seen none of this, despite the very long runway between passage of the bill and implementation, which we're worried can leave business owners confused. At the Sanitation budget hearing on March 14th, Commissioner Tisch testified that the Department has \$3.2 million budgeted specifically for CWZ outreach and education,

indication of how Sanitation plans to spend

despite budget cuts. However, there is no

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2	this money in advance of September to prepare
3	business in the language-diverse communities of
4	Queens Central, including Corona, Jackson
5	Heights, and East Elmhurst, not what happens
6	when the spending dries up. A robust,
7	culturally-sensitive and language-accessible
8	outreach is critical for businesses to
9	participate in the program successfully.
10	The BP will fight alongside the City
11	Council for restoration of this outreach and
12	education funding, but at the same time,
13	Sanitation must make specific plans for this
14	effort, in the pilot district, public and start
15	their outreach efforts now.
16	The second thing is Matrix, which Eric
17	already mentioned. Given that this is a pilot,
18	how will the Department measure success?
19	Sanitation said on the record in the past that
20	they believed the way that we designed this
21	program, it was on a path to failure; the
22	borough president and his former colleagues
23	obviously disagreed. They did not envision a
24	pilot district in the legislation, and so set
25	no metrics to evaluate the program's impact,

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2	based on implementation in only one district,
3	so it's critical that Sanitation share its
4	goals and evaluation criteria so that DSNY, the
5	industry, the businesses, and the public can
6	all fairly evaluate how the program is working
7	and what needs to change, if anything, before a
8	full program rollout.
9	The third thing is oversight. DSNY is
10	currently out of compliance with the law
11	because they have not convened with the
12	commercial waste and safety task force since
13	March of 2022, I believe, based on the notes
14	that are on the website. The law tasked DSNY
15	with forming and convening this committee
16	quarterly through 2021, and annually through
17	2024.
18	Additionally, Council Member Sandy Nurse
19	has proposed intro 352, which would create a
20	commercial waste zones working group to advise
21	on other elements of the program, outside of
22	just safety, and the borough president
23	encourages the Department to convene the safety
24	task force in advance of implementing the pilot
25	district, to advise on the metrics mentioned

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1 2 above and to support passage of intro 352 and/or create the working group on its own. 3 4 Finally, I want to underscore how 5 important it is we get this now. Since the Department chose to announce all the carters 6 7 that were selected at once, we're already seeing consolidation within the industry, 8 9 creating a potentially chaotic situation where 10 carters that were not selected may go out of 11 business before selected carters can 12 technically begin their work in the district, 13 potentially leaving businesses without 14 services, so it's critical that we move to full 15 implementation quickly and efficiently with 16 sufficient transparency and accountability to 17 build trust with the industry, local 18 businesses, and the public. 19 Thank you. 20 MS. LIGUORI: Thank you very much, Lacy. 21 Next to testify is Justin Wood from the 22 New York Lawyers for the Public Interest. 23 MR. WOOD: Good morning. Can everyone 24 hear me okay? Great, thank you. 25 Good afternoon, my name is Justin Wood,

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2	and I'm the director of policy at New York
3	Lawyers for the Public Interest, NYLPI. We're
4	a founding member of the Transform Don't Trash
5	NYC Coalition, which for more then a decade has
6	advocated for fundamental reform of the City's
7	sprawling commercial waste system.
8	We are strongly supportive of the goals
9	of Local Law 199, the law mandating a citywide
10	transition to a zone commercial waste system
11	passed over four years ago in 2019.
12	The clear intent of this law is to
13	simultaneously make the current inefficient,
14	dangerous and polluting commercial waste system
15	far more transparent, accountable, efficient,
16	and safe, while giving the City the tools it
17	needs to sharply incentivize reductions in the
18	vast amounts of commercial waste currently
19	disposed in landfills and incinerators.
20	After years of delay in implementation, we
21	are excited to see DSNY introduce this rule,
22	beginning to set a timeline for transition to a
23	new system in which designated private
24	sanitation companies will finally be
25	accountable to contractual standards negotiated

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with the City.

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However, we are concerned by the extremely limited scope of the proposed rule, which sets a transition timeline for only one of 20 zones, a tiny slice of the overall system, and by the extremely limited amount of information the Department has released about plans to achieve waste reduction, reduce vehicle miles traveled, increase worker and pubic safety, and reduce pollution and traffic burdens on environmental justice communities located within and near the initial Central Queens zone.

14 Thus far, the public has not been able to 15 view details of the plans submitted by each designated hauler in the first zone, including 16 17 waste diversion plans, customer education 18 plans, VMT reduction plans, prices, and the 19 names and qualifications of all subcontractors, 20 transfer stations, recycling facilities, and 21 micro-haulers that the designated haulers intend to utilize to service the zone. 22

We remain concerned that some designated haulers, currently acting as brokers, may utilize subcontractors that could undermine the

1 2 high environmental and labor standards envisioned in Local Law 199. 3 4 We, therefore, hope that transparent, full disclosure of contract details and a scaled-up 5 commercial enforcement and customer education 6 7 program are forthcoming. Finally, I want to stress that the CWC 8 system cannot achieve the transformational 9 10 change and infrastructure investments necessary 11 to achieve New York City and state's urgent 12 environmental and safety mandates if it is 13 treated as a limited pilot program, rather than 14 a citywide transition to a new, high-performing 15 waste system. For example, waste diversion will require citywide coordinated customer and 16 17 employee education and training to successfully 18 integrate organics recycling, donation of food 19 and useful products and major reductions in 20 disposable plastics into hundreds of thousands 21 of business' daily operation citywide. This 22 can and must be synchronized with DSNY's plan to, for example, expand residential curbside 23 24 organics recycling service citywide over the next year, so that New Yorkers finally learn 25

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2	one set of simple and accessible rules and
3	behaviors, regardless of whether they are
4	recycling at home, at work, or in a public
5	building or space.
6	Moreover, we need the waste industry to be
7	able to make the major investments needed in
8	organics recycling facilities, zero emission
9	trucks, customer service infrastructure and
10	community-level services, such as micro-haulers
11	and waste auditors, to achieve the goals of
12	Local Law 199, Plan NYC, and the New York State
13	Climate Leadership and Community Protection,
14	the CLCPA. This will be difficult or
15	impossible for the industry if DSNY does not
16	provide an on scale and capital financing that
17	can only be achieved by rolling out a firm
18	timeline for a citywide transition to the new
19	CWZ system.
20	We therefore hope that DSNY will soon
21	propose rules setting firm timelines for
22	transition to the full CWZ system for the
23	remaining 19 zones.
24	Thank you for the opportunity to testify
25	today. We hope to work in partnership with the

1 2 Department, City Council, borough presidents, and all the stakeholders of this exciting new 3 4 system, to ensure that it reaches its envisioned transformational potential. 5 Thank 6 you. 7 MS. LIGUORI: Thank you very much. Right now, no one else has signed up to 8 9 testify. If you wish to testify at this time, 10 you can please indicate so in the chat. 11 (No response.) 12 I believe you can use the raise hand 13 function in Teams as well, so you can use that 14 as well. 15 MS. LIGUORI: Last call. If you would like to testify, you may use the raise hand 16 function or indicate so in the chat. 17 18 (No response.) 19 I'm going to repeat that, since someone 20 just joined.
